


## A Path to Safety

Helping people and pets escape violence in Ontario.





### Safe Pets mean Safe Families.

The decision to leave or to stay in an abusive home is complicated and fraught with fear. But for 47% of survivors, the decision to leave comes down to one important factor: their pet. Nearly half of abuse victims will delay leaving their abuser, or will not leave at all, if they cannot take their pet with them to safety.

Most human shelters in Ontario do not accept pets. Tragically, this significant gap in service means that 60% of those escaping an abusive partner are forced to leave their pet behind with their abuser, and 1/3 of those survivors will consider returning to their abuser to protect their pet. This puts clients, pets, children, and confidentially-located Violence Against Women shelters at serious risk of harm.

This is where SafePet Ontario comes in. We bridge this dangerous gap in the gender-based violence sector by providing pet-safekeeping for survivors of family violence and human trafficking for up to one year. We do this through a network of pet foster families, veterinarians, frontline service workers, and law enforcements across the province. Our innovative pet-safekeeping program ensures that vulnerable adult and child victims can escape their abuser sooner. Safe pets mean safe families. It's that simple.

## But we need philanthropic support to keep saving lives.

Our services to those escaping violence and abuse are free of charge to all clients. We cover veterinary costs and also ensure that our confidential pet foster families incur limited costs for their pet's care. Our Placement Coordinator provides regular updates to owners, and when pets return to home we send food, toys, bedding, and leashes/harnesses as a "welcome home" package.

Our clients are primarily those who identify as women, but we accept anyone in Ontario who is a survivor of family violence or sex trafficking—regardless of age, gender, or sexual identity.

Through thoughtful investment from donors and sponsoring partners, SafePet Ontario can provide increased and enhanced programs and services that will help survivors and their beloved pets transition from fear and violence to freedom, stability, and long-term safety. With over 35 requests each month for our services (and growing), the need for SafePet Ontario has never been greater.

# We help survivors find safety by helping their pets find safety too.

Initially established in 2017, SafePet Ontario became a registered charity in January 2022. To-date, we have supported over 450 clients and their pets escape dangerous and harmful situations through our services.

Our mission is rooted in academic research. Data shows that intimate partner violence, child abuse, animal abuse, and elder abuse tend to co-occur in families. Abusers inflict violence on family pets as a way of punishing, controlling, and coercing their human victims. This causes intergenerational trauma: children see or hear their pet being abused, and the cycle of violence often continues as those children come of age.

SafePet Ontario doesn't work alone to address these issues. Our organization works collaboratively with a network of organizations and care providers across the province to ensure comprehensive support to survivors, including:

- Police Services (OPP and local law enforcement)
- Violence Against Women Shelters
- Regional Victim Services
- Veterinarians and RVTs
- Animal Shelters and Municipal Animal Services
- Indigenous and Culturally-Specific Community Services
- And other frontline workers

Even with this network of partners, the urgent truth is that the current need for our services is beyond what we can currently address.

The number of victims of gender-based violence and human trafficking in Canada is increasing year over year, and the pandemic and inflationary crisis have only made these numbers escalate. Consequently, SafePet Ontario is seeing an unprecedented number of applications for our services.

To help children and adults find safety sooner, all vulnerable members of a family system—including pets—must be given the opportunity to escape. Victims should never have to choose between leaving violence or leaving their pet(s).

#### Will you help?

44% of women (6.2 million) women aged 15 and older have reported some kind of abuse in their intimate partner relationship in Canada.

Every six days, a woman in Canada is murdered by her intimate partner.

There are elevated risks of violence for women who identify as Indigenous, queer, a visible minority, or are experiencing life with a disability.

89% of Canadian Violence Against Women shelter residents indicate that there has been some form of animal abuse in the home. 85% of these survivors indicate that their children witnessed the animal abuse.

## The Impact of SafePet, with Your Support

SafePet Ontario's unique mission is two-fold:

- 1. We provide pet-safekeeping for survivors of family violence and sex trafficking;
- 2. We educate frontline workers (law enforcement, veterinarians, Victim Services, VAW workers, and child protection workers) and the public about the "link" among animal abuse, elder abuse, child abuse, and intimate partner violence in families.

We are the only province-wide charity of our kind, and with your generous support we will:

- Increase our capacity to triage requests for service, allowing us to serve more clients across all of Ontario

  — ultimately enabling more victims to escape unsafe situations faster.
- Develop and implement an Urgent Response Program that will quickly and efficiently assist high-risk clients who must flee with their pets within 24 hours.
- Increase our presence in Northern Ontario and Indigenous communities, where there is demonstrated need for our programming, by collaborating with existing services and strengthening our network of veterinarians, frontline workers, law enforcement, and transportation volunteers.



- Provide on-demand online educational programming on "the link" among animal abuse elder abuse, child abuse, and intimate partner violence, and the need for pet-safekeeping options for survivors of family violence and human trafficking so local groups can develop programs tailored to their unique needs.
- Increase awareness of our fostering program among Ontario's Violence Against Women shelters, and assist these shelters in becoming pet-friendly themselves.
- Fund more necessary veterinary interventions for SafePet animals, many of whom have untreated injuries. This will allow survivors to devote their limited financial resources to housing, food, and childcare costs.
- Recruit, screen, and train more volunteer foster homes for our confidential network, with the ability to cover all necessary costs of pet care (including food, bedding, supplies, veterinary care, and client/pet transportation). We will then be able to place more animals in temporary safe homes all over Ontario.

35+ requests are received each month for pet-safekeeping services.

Approximately 40 pets are in our care, at any given time, with an average stay of 8 months (with approximately 50 on our waitlist, waiting to be placed).

Our clients range in age from 15 to 70+ and primarily identify as female or non-binary.

On average, SafePet Ontario spends \$700 per pet to cover medications, vet care, food, and pet supplies. Our service is entirely free of charge to clients.

We accept all kinds of pets, from dogs and cats to lizards, birds, and horses.

## A Unique Mission. A Vital Service.

Without intervention, the frequency and severity of the abuse increases over time and becomes volatile for those at risk. There is physical violence and other forms of abuse such as sexual, emotional, spiritual, and financial abuse, which can be equally as harmful. The most difficult part of a violent/abusive relationship is breaking the cycle of abuse.

SafePet Ontario is part of the plan that assists victims in breaking this cycle of violence by providing their pets with a safe place during this transition. As a retired police officer of 30 years, I know firsthand the impact this can have for victims of abuse and it's why I believe in this organization and our mission so deeply."
